# Alcoholics Anonymous Tradition Ten

No A.A. group or member should ever, in such a way as to implicate A.A., express any opinion on outside controversial issues—particularly those of politics, alcohol reform, or sectarian religion. The Alcoholics Anonymous groups oppose no one. Concerning such matters they can express no views whatever.

The tenth tradition is rather clear as it applies to A.A. A.A. has prospered by having no opinion on outside matters and not being drawn into controversy. For instance, A.A. has avoided the outside issues that tore apart the Washingtonians. A.A. has never become a temperance crusader or taken stands on important but outside issues, "particularly those of politics, alcohol reform, or sectarian religion". (See the long form of this tradition on p. 567 of the "Big Book".) What is an outside issue? An outside issue is anything outside of my relationship with God through sobriety. Another way of stating the same idea is to say that I engage in outside issues when I take your inventory. The tenth step and tenth tradition clarify each other: I take my own inventory and not yours. The relationship is even stronger than I have indicated: if I do not take my own inventory on a regular basis, I will end up taking your inventory! The principle of the tenth tradition is the same for the A.A. group and the A.A. member: we turn from a controversial point of view to a peacemaker point of view. The application of this principle is what differentiates me from A.A., however. A.A. is not involved in political or social issues or other important issues in the world, but I am.

# Tradition Ten Checklist

Alcoholics Anonymous has no opinion on outside issues; hence the A.A. name ought never be drawn into public controversy.

- 1.Do I ever give the impression that there really is an "AA 'opinion" on doctors? Psychiatrists? Churches? Hospitals? Jails? Alcohol? Prescribed medications? Other drugs? Other 12-Step programs? Vitamins? Al-Anon? The federal or provincial government?
- 2..Can I honestly share my own personal experience concerning any of those without giving the impression that I'm stating the "AA opinion"?
- 3. What in AA history gave rise to our Tenth Tradition?
- 4. What would AA be without this tradition? Where would I be?
- 5.Do I breach this or any of its supporting traditions in subtle, perhaps unconscious ways?
- 6.How can I manifest the spirit of this Tradition in my personal life outside AA? Inside AA?
- 7. Should the meeting secretary intervene to remind AA members about this Tradition if a member starts criticizing one political party compared to others or favoring a religion over others?

# Spiritual Principle Step Ten : Discipline

The word "discipline" comes from the Latin word "disciple", which means student...one who follows a given set of teachings, learning, or training. This couldn't be more appropriate, because following a <a href="twelve-step program">twelve-step program</a> of recovery is a learning process aimed at attaining a set of skills that are necessary to achieve the desired goal of sobriety.

Discipline by choice is mindfulness before you make a decision that could negatively impact you. It's an opportunity to create a structure to your day so you don't fall into those bad patterns of behavior. When you're disciplined all of the actions that you're taking are manifesting a better outcome and improving your quality of life. We are in control of our lives and we can choose if it's going to be "one day" or day one.

The principle of discipline offers an opportunity for us to better ourselves; it's not necessarily the things that you want to do, but the things that you need to do. Discipline by choice is creating or developing healthy habits to enable success in your life. To me, discipline starts with a routine

#### **Step Ten Prayer**

God, remove the Selfishness, dishonesty, resentment and fear that has cropped up in my life right now. Help me to discuss this with someone immediately and make amends quickly if I have harmed anyone. Help me to cease fighting anything and anyone. Show me where I may be helpful to someone else. Help me react sanely; not cocky or afraid. How can I best serve You – Your will, not mine be done. Amen.





#### AN ALCOHOLICS OPINION ON TRADITION TEN

I am Chad, a member of A.A. with just over half a decade of spiritual progression this time around. Discussing Tradition throughout my years in A.A. has received mixed reviews. I've heard many opinions regarding outside issues, particularly religion, as it ties so closely with spirituality. In A.A., I've found that a significant number of people attending meetings are relatively new in their recovery journey. At six years in, I still feel that I am learning and progressing. At the beginning, I had little understanding the traditions. I had a limited sense of who I was and no desire to learn about the background suggestions of the program; I was simply trying to find myself. forward a few years, and importance of staying on topic in a meeting has proven crucial to preventing groups from falling apart. I've witnessed this firsthand and seen the impact that outside issues can have on a group. Traditions serve as guidelines to keep A.A. as a whole effective and able to reach the next suffering alcoholic. Bringing outside issues into a group detracts from spreading the message and can ultimately hinder someone's first attempt at reaching out for help. individuals were courageous enough to come to the meeting seeking a message on recovering from a hopeless state of mind, but instead, they hear about how the Mariners beat the Blue Jays. There is a time and place for everything, and it is imperative that groups remain on topic, guided by the outlined traditions. I often find myself reflecting on what I say during a meeting when asked to share. I even state, "That is an outside issue," almost as if I am keeping myself in check and signaling others to do the same, should it occur.

It sounds like I had a rocky start, doesn't it? Of course, I did. Many do! We are not saints, but we continue to do the work necessary to trudge the road of happy destiny. It is a spiritual journey, walking hand in hand with a higher power of your own choosing. It is not anyone's role to name your higher power. Others may have their own ideas and may share them with you, but ultimately, this is your decision. A.A. does not promote a specific religion. It is purely spiritual and inclusive for all, as stated in the A.A. preamble, which is shared at most meetings. It is imperative that all groups honor the traditions as outlined. Trials and tribulations have already played out over the course of A.A.'s existence. As alcoholics, we tend to want to control our surroundings. A.A. provides an encouraging environment that allows alcoholics to improve themselves and find, through their efforts, a sane and manageable future. Any group has an openpolicy, stemming from another tradition. important However, not members belong to the same group.

We must remember that we are sick people, and sick people sometimes don't mix well with other sick people. People, places, and things—all causes of resentment. Most meetings, believe it or not, start from resentment. A good meeting is one that endures over time, stays within guidelines of the traditions, and maintains responsible membership necessarily measured by years of service). Politics, religion, sports, sitcoms, social media-these are all examples of outside issues A.A. has no opinions on. Therefore, in discussions of these outside issues, the A.A. name is not brought up, keeping A.A. free of external influences and remaining self-sustained.

TREATMENT COMMITTEE

This non-influenced program creates a secure structure that gives the alcoholic a chance to recover, once and for all. Hence, myself. I would have never had this knowledge to share with the newsletter had I not put in the work to better myself, and it was an honor to be asked. Imagine that! People asking me. Six years ago, that would not have happened. Progression happens. Patience is key. Give yourself time to let the promises come true. You are a miracle, and you'll soon be doing things you never dreamed of! You just have to put in a little bit of work, guided by an agent of God as your sponsor and, of course, your higher power of your choice. Best of luck on your journey, reader.



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# LGBTQ Alcoholics in A.A.

The official A.A. literature includes a wonderful pamphlet on 2SLGBTQAI+ alcoholics published in 2018. This is intended for those that are part of the LGBTQ+ community as well as for allies who support us. The pamphlet includes stories by recovering alcoholics who self-identify as Two Spirited, Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual, Trans and Transitionina, Queer, Asexual, and Intersex individuals. Thirteen LGBTQ+ alcoholics chronicle their experience before and after joining Alcoholics Anonymous, and how—despite their trepidations about A.A.—they discover that they belong in any A.A. meeting, not just LGBTQ+ meetings. The stories all discuss the feelings each alcoholic felt before joining A.A., such as angry and resentful, gnawing anxieties, not fitting in, and many other adjectives that accurately describe most alcoholics before they enter recovery. The stories all end with feelings of real friendship and love, acceptance, welcoming attitude, and having a sense of purpose after joining the rooms, doing Step work, and connecting with the larger A.A. community. The overarching message therefore is that there is no selective process or barriers to joining the A.A. program: we are all equal as fellow recovering alcoholics. In addition, and probably the most important takeaway from the pamphlet, is that our recovery from alcohol is what binds us together, not our sexual identity.

### LET LITERATURE CARRY THE MESSAGE, TOO.

You have a home group, a sponsor, you've completed a set of Steps (maybe more than once) and you've enjoyed two years or more of sobriety. All of that and more is laid out in Chapter 6 -- INTO ACTION -- of the Big Book, Alcoholics Anonymous, the basic text (for our Society), our LITERATURE.

"Frequent contact with each other is the bright spot of our lives." Questions arise. Want more information about the Home Group, about the position of the General Service Rep (GSR), about group inventories, about sponsorship, and other topics? The information is available in pamphlets, our LITERATURE.

Thirty-three in-person meetings are available to us every week. Sections from other books such as As Bill Sees It, Daily Reflections, Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions are read aloud and members share their experience, strength and hope. Home groups depend on the D39 Literature Chair to have those books in stock, our LITERATURE.

The position of Literature Chair is vital to the support, growth and maintenance of our fellowship. Come to our next District 39 Business Meeting on October 22nd and volunteer to be our next Literature Chair, January 2025 to December 2026. (Submitted by D39 Literature Chair, Marion T.)
