DCM REPORT

Hello D39 members,

Happy New Year, welcome to our Alcoholics Anonymous Panel 75 and may the A.A. Promises come true in each of our lives.

I am Dedar, grateful member of A.A., currently serving as DCM in your District 39 (Abbotsford, Clearbrook and Matsqui area).

On October 7th, 2019, I was facing an emotional abyss and drinking spree as my personal life had become unmanageable ("How dark it is before dawn!", Big Book, p 8). On October 10th, 2019, I attended my first A.A. meeting, and felt a warm welcome, sincerity, and a place of belonging. The old sense of loneliness and despair within me had started to dissipate, even though it was for a fleeting moment; but, it was the beginning for me. The sense of freedom, happiness and spiritual presence in the room was soothing to my soul - even though I did not comprehend much of it to any significant extent (I had taken my 1st Step in A.A.). Later I would discover the promises of Steps 2, 3, 4 and 5 as well.

Several months into my A.A. journey, I heard and read "The Promises" and believed that they were the promises of the program and often looked forward to when these promises would materialize in my life. Several years later, I learned that these "Promises" were of Step 9 and would materialize as I worked through it.

Through perseverance, I learned that the other Steps also have Promises and these Promises had materialized in my life earlier in my A.A. sobriety.

Today, the feeling of being part of something much greater continues to grow as I continue to in A.A. by following Steps, Traditions, and Concepts. And, that sense of inner peace, serenity and calmness that I had been seeking in my life is returning to me, often preceded by painstaking process(s) – as said in Step 9 Promises.

A.A. is rooted in love and with love all things are possible. GOD IS LOVE & LOVE IS GOD. & GOD BLESS .

Step 1

What Does It Mean to Admit Powerlessness"?

Admitting powerlessness is not the same as admitting weakness. It means asking for help, leaning on others and relying on your support system. It means admitting—and accepting—that you're living with a disease that alters your brain. It might seem backward, but when you admit that you don't have power, you finally access the power you need.

Tradition 1 is based on the fact that unity within the group will allow members of Alcoholics Anonymous groups to make more progress.

The underlying message:

While you want to reach your own individual goal of sobriety, your journey can become rudderless if you place "self" over others.



Our common welfare should come first; personal recovery depends upon AA unity.

- 1. Am I, in my group, a healing, mending, integrating person? Am I sometimes divisive? Do I ever gossip or take another member's inventory?
- 2. Am I a peacemaker? Or do I foster arguments with statements such as "just for the sake of discussion"?
- 3. Am I gentle with those who rub me the wrong way, or am I sometimes abrasive?
- 4.Do I make competitive AA remarks, such as comparing one group with another or contrasting AA in one place with AA in another?
- 5.Do I ever put down some AA activities for not participating in this or that aspect of AA?
- 6. Am I informed about AA as a whole? Do I support AA as a whole in every way I can, or just the parts that I understand and approve of?
- 7.Am I considerate of AA members as I want them to be of me?
- 8.Do I spout platitudes about love while indulging in and secretly justifying behavior that bristles with hostility?

Dear Lord,

I admit that I am powerless over my alcoholism. I admit that my life is unmanageable when I try to control it.

Help me this day to understand the true meaning of powerlessness. Remove from me all denial of my addiction.

Concept One

Final responsibility and ultimate authority for A.A. world services should always reside in the collective conscience of our whole Fellowship.

There are bosses in AA. These bosses are you and me, that's what Concept I says. The whole membership is, collectively, the one and only ultimate authority in AA.

Hi, I am an alcoholic and I am on a path of joy.

When I came to the program of Alcoholics Anonymous, I was happy on the outside, and I was absolutely miserable on the inside. I had no sense of purpose, I was about to lose my job, was battlina evervone and everything in my life, my relationships were poor, and my family was getting really tired of my bull...nonsense...if you know what I mean. I had given up on my dreams of completing my education, becoming a teacher, and becoming a wife and a parent. Like it savs in our literature, "Ouicksand stretched around me in all directions." I had no hope. I had long lost my joy. I knew I had a choice; I could admit defeat and be willing to make some changes, or I could go on to the bitter end.



I figured I had nothing to lose, so I came to A.A. At first, I gave it a solid 50%. I was sober from alcohol, but I was still using outside issues for about a year. It was in that time that I learned that some of the people in this program had true joy and happiness. The stories they shared were authentic. Their laughter was hearty and came from deep within their chests. They had a sparkle in their eyes that can only come from emotional sobriety. I knew that in order to have what they had, I needed to do what they did: build a connection with my Higher Power and work the program. I discovered that the only way I could build a connection with my Higher Power was to abstain from all mood and/or mind-altering substances.

The first couple of years were hard. I was digging my way out of an incredibly dark place. Thanks to the fellowship, I knew that I wasn't alone, and that many of us had dug our way out of that same darkness. I attended regular meetings. I got a sponsor, W.B., who changed my world. They gave me something that I had longed for my entire life, unconditional love and acceptance.

They took me through the Big Book. I did the steps. I uncovered the truth behind my misery, lack of purpose, constant battles, and lost dreams (spoiler, it was ME). While not all of it was my fault, I was responsible for at least some aspect of all of it. I began taking accountability for my actions and in my relationships. I became an active participant in my life, and I discovered that there was so much joy in that!

Today, my life has purpose. People in this program have guided me and supported me while I re-discover the dreams that I had long given up on. I am back in school. It's taken me many years to get a 4-year degree - so I focus on being grateful for the knowledge I have gained personally and academically in this long journey. I rescue senior cats. I no longer feel the need to comply to societal expectations to become and mother and a wife. I find my contentment in being an Aunty, an educator, and a steward to animals. I am learning that my recovery from alcoholism was only the beginning. I came to A.A. to stop drinking, but in the end, I stayed for the emotional sobriety. Today I have purpose in being of service to others, happiness in nature, and joy in connection with other alcoholics.



I can make a difference by making and sharing a simple pot of soup. I discovered that I am incredibly loved by my Higher Power and by those I walk this journey with today.

We can all find joy. We can all escape from the dark places we are in or we have been in. Our Higher Power wants that for us. Our fellows want that for us as well. We deserve it. To everyone who has been a part of my journey, I am grateful to you. May we continue to trudge the road of happy destiny together. —Anonymous
