CONCEPT SIX

On behalf of A.A. as a whole, our General Service Conference has the principle responsibility for the maintenance of our world services, and it traditionally has the final decision respecting large matters of general policy and finance. But the Conference also recognizes that the chief initiative and the active responsibility in most of these matters should be exercised primarily by the Trustee members of the Conference when they act among themselves as the General Service Board of Alcoholics Anonymous.

Every AA group ought never endorse. finance or lend the AA name to any related facility or outside enterprise, lest problems of money, property and prestige divert us from our primary purpose.

 - 5. Our group's landlord is raising money to pay for a new roof on the building. Should the group make a contribution? What if the landlord specifically asks the group to make a contribution?

IS SERVICE FOR YOU?

We're exploring the option of renting a school bus for transportation to and from the upcoming 4-day convention.

Taking the bus would save you the hassle of driving, paying for gas, and daily parking at the venue (which costs \$56.75 per day). The estimated cost for the bus is between \$15 and \$30 per person per day, depending on how many people join.

If at least 47 people express interest in riding the bus, we will move forward with planning and determine specific pickup and drop-off times based on the needs and preferences of the majority of those riding the bus.

MY WORK STARTS HERE

Having done a thorough Step 4 and a grueling Step 5, it was time to get on with Step 6. I felt ready to get right at it.

As I had developed a belief in a higher power and I now prayed to God daily, I was now willing to take the next step. I was certainly concerned about how to do it and how I'd feel, but my faith was strong so I said a prayer and looked at my "list".

With a long drinking history, I knew I'd have my work cut out. I spoke to my sponsor and friends within my home group, seeking advice on how to move forward. I got the same answer from all those I asked. They said to look over your Step 5 notes and find your obvious defects.

The seven deadly sins are:

Pride	Greed
Lust	Envy
Gluttony	Wrath
Sloth	

And with each of them I had noted what my part was. What an eye opener! I spoke to my pastor about all of this and he said that Drunkenness was also a sin but drinking was not. So, I soon realized I had a nasty lustful habit when drinking and I would do or say whatever it took to get my way. I was quite prepared to do anything to support my drinking, up to and including various robberies. On top of this there were lots of instances of marital infidelity. I was quite willing to steal from my employers or anyone to support my alcoholism.

I got out my Big Book and my 12x12 looking for guidance. I realized I couldn't wish all my defects away with a simple prayer, and I would have to tackle them one at a time.

My compulsion for alcohol had left me a few months later and I had a solid program of prayer and meditation which I practice daily; I also go to lots of meetings. I felt that I was ready to work on these defects one at a time. I stopped there and reviewed everything I had written down and decided I had done all that I could, as honestly as I could, So, I felt ready to move on...

BUT, that's a story for next month.

LITERATURE CORNER

Alcoholics Anonymous (A.A.) literature is not just helpful; it is essential to the A.A. program. It preserves the original message of recovery and offers consistent, trusted guidance to members around the world. conscience process.This ensures the literature is representative of the Fellowship as a whole, not based on outside opinions or personal theories.

1. Preserving the Message-

Literature like the Big Book and Twelve Steps and Twelve Traditions captures the experience, strength, and hope of those who have recovered. It protects the integrity of A.A.'s message by offering a consistent foundation regardless of time or location.

- 2. A Tool for Recovery—Members use A.A. literature to understand their illness and work through the 12 Steps. It offers guidance, daily reflection, spiritual principles, and solutions for living sober. Literature is often read during meetings, alone, or with sponsors.
- 3. Fellowship Unity—Approved literature provides a shared language and common understanding across the global Fellowship. It ensures meetings worldwide remain anchored in the original A.A. program.
- 4. Sponsorship and Step Work— Sponsors use A.A. literature to guide others through the Steps. It prevents confusion by grounding personal sharing in collective A.A. wisdom.
- 5. Group Conscience and Tradition— All official A.A. literature is approved through a group

IN SUMMARY

A.A. literature is the backbone of the program's unity, clarity, and spiritual direction. It safeguards the message, supports personal recovery, and unifies members with a shared foundation.

THE 24-HOUR A.A. HELPLINE **NEEDS YOU**
