Step 7 Prayer

STEP

My Creator, I am now willing that you should have all of me, good and bad. I pray that you now remove from me every single defect of character which stands in the way of my usefulness to you and my fellows. Grant me strength, as I go out from here, to do your bidding. Amen.

This step is about becoming truly willing to change and asking a Higher Power to help us do what we can't do alone. After identifying our character defects in the previous steps, Step 7 is the act of surrender -where we humbly ask for those shortcomings to be removed. It's not about becoming perfect but about being open to spiritual growth. This step teaches humility by reminding us that real change comes from a power greater than ourselves. We let go of pride, fear, selfishness, and other defects, trusting that through this willingness and honest effort, we can grow into the people we were meant to be.

CONCEPT SEVEN

The Charter and Bylaws of the General Service Board are legal instruments, empowering the trustees to manage and conduct world service affairs. The Conference Charter is not a legal document; it relies upon tradition and the A.A. purse for final effectiveness. Concept VII explains that the General Service Board has the legal authority to manage AA's world services, like handling money and making contracts. However, the General Service Conference — which represents the voice of AA as a whole — doesn't have legal power. Instead, it works through spiritual principles and group conscience. This concept shows how AA balances legal responsibility with spiritual guidance: while the Trustees have the legal tools, they are expected to follow the will of the Fellowship, not act on their own.

Tradition

Every group ought to be fully self-supporting, declining outside contributions

AA groups should pay their own way and not take money from anvone outside of AA. This helps keep AA independent, focused only on helping alcoholics, and free from outside control or influence. Members chip in what they can to cover things like rent, coffee, and literature. It's a way of taking responsibility for our own recovery and keeping AA safe and honest for everyone.

CHECKLIST

That's where we started and we followed the suggestions in chapter 5 and he went through the steps in just over two months, and he has been sober for over 5 years. He moved away for work and lives up country but we still talk or text daily. I have been involved with other people as well as either a temporary sponsor or adviser and it helps me stay focused on my own program. The Big Book and the 12 x 12 and the patience of my sponsor is what got me sober and a lot of help from my higher power who I chose to call God.

CORRECTIONS CORNER

"The purpose of a corrections committee is to coordinate the work of individual A.A. members and groups who are interested in carrying the A.A. message of recovery to alcoholics in correctional facilities, and to set up means to help the person in custody transition from the facility into the A.A. community." [Corrections Workbook, pg. 41]. THANK YOU to D39 fellowship for your 7th Tradition contributions. Our budget for this term will enable Michael S and I to donate books to Matsqui prison (men) and Fraser Valley Institute (women). Based on the three pillars of service. here are some highlights during the month:

1) Attend A.A. Meetings

"Meetings within prison function like meetings outside, but with heightened need to be consistent, and to follow security protocols, and respect rules of institutions. Our purpose is to share experience, strength and hope. We also provide literature." [Area79 Corrections Chair Chad P, Grassroots, April Issue, page 35].

Michael and I attend A.A. meetings in the prisons on Tuesday nights, and the insiders keep us informed of their literature needs and wants. 2) Corrections Correspondence – a special kind of service – A.A. Form F-26

Two female D39 A.A. members applied during the month of May. Copies of this form are on the bulletin board of the Alano Club downstairs or ask your Correction Chairs (Michael S and Marion T.) for a copy.

"Members correspond by mail with members of the same gender identity. Members correspond with members 700 miles away.

No prison experience is needed; A.A. experience is.

People inside must choose to participate on their own. We do not provide letters of reference or sponsors for people inside." [Grassroots, April Issue, page 35]. 3) Corrections Pre-Release. "Past experience has shown that

attending an A.A. meeting on the outside on the day of release from prison is one of the most effective tools in making a sober transition and maintaining continued sobriety in the free world. It is strongly recommended that anyone in custody who is an A.A. member have an A.A. contact on the outside (preferably with at least one year's sobriety and of the same sex) who contacts and arranges to meet him or her on the day of release to help in "Bridging the Gap" between the institution and A.A. on the outside." Two Pre-Release applications were collected from Fraser Valley Institution (women) and forwarded to Area79's Correction Chair. Chad P. Two members from D39 participated in the entire Area79 June Assembly, namely your two Correction Chairs!! It was a very FULL-filling weekend, one highlight of which was to hear our Area Delegate's Report; the other was to witness D45's winning bid to host WRAASA 2027 assembly in Abbotsford at the Clarion Conference Centre.
