#### TRADITION



"Alcoholics Anonymous should remain forever nonprofessional, but our service centers may employ special workers."

#### CONCEPT



A.A. Concept 9 is a principle of world service that emphasizes the importance of good, selfless leadership at all levels of the fellowship.

It states that for Alcoholics Anonymous to function safely and effectively in the future, it must continuously seek out and elect qualified leaders who act as trusted servants, not as governors.

A.A. defines professionalism as the occupation of counselling alcoholics for fees or hire. but we may employ alcoholics where they are going to perform those services for which we might otherwise have to

engage nonalcoholics. Such special services may be well recompensed. Our usual twelfth step work is never to be paid.

## TRChecklist \ 9



**Non-Organization Principle:** Reflect on how your group adheres to the principle of being a fellowship rather than an organized entity. Does your group avoids hierarchical structures that might lead to governance over its members.



**Service Committees:** Evaluate how service committees function within your group. Do they exist to serve the group and its members, rather than to exert control or authority?



**Decision-Making Process:** Assess the decision-making process within your group. Is it based on group conscience, allowing all members to have a voice, rather than a top-down directive?



**Leadership Roles:** Examine how leadership roles are perceived. Are they viewed as opportunities for service rather than positions of power?



**Clarity of Purpose:** Ensure your group maintains clarity about its primary purpose—helping alcoholics achieve sobriety. Are activities and decisions aligned with this purpose?



**Flexibility and Autonomy:** Consider how your group upholds flexibility and respects the autonomy of other groups and members, recognizing that each group can operate in ways that best serve its needs.

#### I MADE A LIST

I thought long and hard about Step 8. Using my Step 5 conversation and consulting with my Sponsor, I thought that quite confident to proceed. I was ready to deal with Step 9 but let's not get ahead of ourselves here.

I grew up on the poor side of town so I learned to steal at a young age. As I got older that didn't change and I eventually got caught and thrown in jail. I was in and out of various jails for over 10 years. If I needed money to finance my alcoholism, I just stole anything I could whether it was cash or a car which I could sell. I lost many good jobs and destroyed a marriage with my infidelities.

I eventually ended up in a penitentiary and was introduced to AA. and that is where this begins...

I managed to get myself into a treatment center and started on the 12 steps. I failed the first time but realized where I had gone wrong: I had not accepted month.... for the... any higher power in my life. I had to learn to pray and accept God into my life and I put a Prayer program together that I follow daily. I completed Steps 4 and 5 and I have all the

information I need for Step 9 but am I ready? Using my extensive Step 4 notes I felt In my case, as I live with my immediate family and I've been sober a couple of years, I thought that now was the time. I spoke to my sponsor and the pastor at the church I've been attending. I read everything there was in the big book and the 12x12, and after church that Sunday I thought that I was pretty well ready. I gave myself 24 hours to review everything I had written and see if I saw anything missing. There was not. I looked over my Step 5 summary and said a prayer and started. I knew other things would pop up as I started so I put pen and paper out to make notes if necessary. Was I ready? Absolutely.

Since I live with my children and my 1st wife it seemed like an obvious place to start. If you want to know how that turned out? Check back here next

#### **CORRECTIONS CORNER**

THE HEART OF CORRECTIONS SERVICE
CARRYING THE MESSAGE BEHIND THE WALLS

When we talk about A.A. Corrections Service, it's easy to focus on logistics — clearances, schedules, facility policies. But at its core, this service is about something much deeper: hope, connection, and responsibility.

Incarcerated alcoholics often feel forgotten — by family, by society, sometimes even by themselves. For many, an A.A. meeting inside a correctional facility is the first time they hear someone say, "I've been where you are. You're not alone."

Corrections Service is one of the clearest expressions of our Twelfth Step: carrying the message to the alcoholic who still suffers — no matter where they are. We don't go behind the walls to save or fix anyone. We go to share our experience, strength, and hope. Sometimes, it's just sitting in a circle and telling the truth. And that's enough.

There's no hierarchy in those rooms. Titles, sentences, and circumstances

fall away. What remains is the "we" of A.A. — alcoholics helping alcoholics, one day at a time.

And there's a paradox here: some of the most spiritually free people in A.A. are still physically incarcerated. They've found freedom not through the system, but through surrender, honesty, and connection.

This service doesn't just help others — it keeps us sober. Every time we show up, we remember where we came from and what was freely given to us.

**As the A.A**. Responsibility Statement reminds us:

"I am responsible. When anyone, anywhere, reaches for help, I want the hand of A.A. always to be there."

**Corrections Service** makes sure that hand reaches all the way behind the walls.
